SELF TEACHING, DO IT YOURSELF

These DIY piano and piano learning strategies eliminate the "middle man," saving you a lot of dollars and requiring a lot of personal determination on your part. Are you up for the challenge?v

STANDARD CURRICULUM OF USED PIANO TEACHING

This is the most reliable and holistic DIY approach, because it follows an established pedagogical ("piano and piano teaching") curriculum.

If you choose this path, choose from majors such as Alfred Piano and Piano Methods, Bastien Piano Basics by Kjos, Faber and Faber Piano Adventure Series, and the Suzuki Method. Many piano and piano teachers use methods like this, and for good reason.

Music education professionals have developed these methods and these popular training programs have successfully prepared students for generations.

Although each category distinguishes itself from the others with some philosophical or pedagogical nuance, they all follow a similar pattern.

Additional but optional resources may also be available, including popular tunes, Christian hymns, hymns, Christmas carols, duets, and more. As you can see, this DIY method offers a lot of resources.

By using this standard curriculum approach, you get the most comprehensive DIY learning experience possible at a reasonable price.

Most of these tutorials provide useful and detailed explanations for important concepts, enhanced with colorful symbols and illustrations, which will help you overcome the absence of a teacher.

Even so, you will need to apply yourself diligently. If you don't understand the concept, you'll need to Google or YouTube or ask a skilled musician who is willing to answer your questions.

LEARN MUSIC THEORY AND APPLY WHAT YOU LEARN TO THE KEYBOARD

This strategy takes a more minimal approach than a full piano and piano curriculum, focusing only on music theory.

This means that you will focus on the written and structural elements of the music, but not on the technique, style and practice of making sounds on the keyboard (you will have to figure out these last elements yourself).

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To benefit from this approach, you need an innate musicality and a high personal ability to apply and analyze information in a practical, musical way without outside help.

As difficult as this method may seem, it offers some valuable advantages.

You can buy the theory books for the syllabus I mentioned earlier, but you don't buy the methods and techniques books either.

You can also buy a book dedicated to explaining piano and piano theory in a thorough and simple way, such as Willard Palmer's Complete Book of Chords, Arpeggios and Cadences.

In addition to being affordable, this approach equips you to play the piano and piano in a smart way. You learn to think carefully about the music you play.

In short, you should see this method as playing by ear on steroids. You will learn to produce musical sounds and songs by learning what you are playing on the keyboard and why you are playing it that way.

But you don't learn how to sit, how to position your hands and arms, how to press buttons, how to pull off difficult steps, and how to express yourself as maturely as possible.

Piano and piano playing by ear

If learning piano and piano with just music theory is playing by ear on "steroids," then playing by ear is... well, um... playing by ear without steroids.

This approach will satisfy only the most experienced reader, because you will learn nothing more than what you can discover for yourself, and even then you will not know what you have discovered.

As you can imagine, this stands out as the most affordable option because you don't pay any tutors and you don't buy any books or curriculum. (If you want some tutorials to follow this approach, check out Listen and Play)

But the biggest disadvantage of this approach is also obvious - you don't get any help or external support except yourself.

To play existing music by ear, you need to listen carefully and repeatedly to the songs you want to play. Then you should try playing these songs on the keyboard by trial and error, first developing the melody and then adding additional notes and harmonies.

In order to play new music, you must first imagine the sounds in your head. Then you need to experiment vocally to see if you can match these sounds on the keyboard.

For a more barebones approach, just play around on the keyboard and see what comes out. Then keep playing until you find some sounds you like and go from there!

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
